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## Archbishop Eamon Martin launches Ireland's most popular Advent Calendar

Archbishop Eamon Martin of Armagh has launched the 2019 online Advent Calendar, which will go live on www.catholicbishops.ie on the first Sunday of Advent, 1 December next. Now in its sixth year, the popular online Advent Calendar offers resources for the parish, school and home which can be accessed behind a virtual door each day during the season of Advent. The content is aimed at assisting people to pray and to reflect on how best we can keep Christ at the centre of our Christmas preparations during this special liturgical season.

The unique interactive Advent Calendar has family prayers and suggestions for #LivingAdvent - acts of kindness or charity that all of us are encouraged to undertake during the month of December. The calendar also shares tips on how families can care for creation, our common home, by having a more sustainable Christmas.

Welcoming the calendar Archbishop Eamon said, "I invite everyone during this Season of Advent to enjoy our online calendar. It is there for people not just to reflect on the content personally but to share on social media. At this busy time I encourage everyone to take a few moments of pause to reflect on the true message of Christmas which is that Christ is alive and is our hope."

## Trócaire launch 'Gift of Trees' to support families in Africa and Asia

Garden designer Diarmuid Gavin, along with students from Scoil Aoife Community National School, Dublin, helped to launch Trócaire's Christmas 'Gifts of Love' for Christmas 2019. Speaking at the launch he said, "Considering my own work, I'm particularly enthused to see that Trócaire has added a gift of trees this year. Trees can do so much to protect and preserve farms and land – they provide nutrients to the soil, which allow crops to grow, they can



prevent landslides during rainy season and they help to reduce flooding."

Trócaire CEO Caoimhe de Barra said, "Families across Africa, Asia and Central America will benefit from the new Gift of Trees. About 70% of the world's poorest people live in rural areas and they depend on farms and the land to survive. Trees are a lifeline in rural communities in many countries where we work like Guatemala, Rwanda, Malawi and Myanmar."

Trócaire's Christmas Gifts campaign has sold more than 945,000 gifts since 2000 amounting to a total of €38m to support families overseas affected by long-term poverty and denial of human rights. Dicastery for Laity, Family and Life establishes International Youth Advisory Body

The Vatican's Dicastery for Laity, Family and Life has announced the establishment of a new International Youth Advisory Body made up of 20 young people from different regions of the world and some international movements, associations and communities. These young people were involved in different phases of the synodal process. This included the International Youth Forum organised last June to encourage the implementation of the apostolic exhortation *Christus vivit*. The group will have an important consultative and proposal-making role to play. They will assist the Dicastery with issues related to youth ministry and other topics of more general interest.
