Archbishop Eamon Martin is Archbishop of Armagh and Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese of Dromore, Primate of All Ireland, President of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference and Chancellor of the Pontifical University, Maynooth. He is also chair of the Council for Communications of the Bishops' Conference. Archbishop Eamon attended the 2018 Synod on Young People, the Faith and Vocational Discernment in Rome, as well as the global gathering of Bishops' Conference leaders and Major Superiors of Religious Congregations on the protection of minors which was hosted by Pope Francis in February 2019.

Senator Joan Freeman is chair of the Joint Oireachtas Committee on the Future of Mental Health Care and has published the *Children's Digital Protection Bill 2018* to

Internet service providers. A psychologist, Senator Freeman was a candidate for the office of the President of Ireland in 2018 and was the founder of Pieta House, the suicide and self-harm charity, in 2014. Senator Freeman is a former member

of the Council for Justice and Peace of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference.
